They take account of one another’s ideas about how to organise their activity. They show sensitivity to others’ needs and feelings, and form positive relationships with adults and other children.</i></p>

Aware of the boundaries set, and of behavioural expectations in the setting. Explains own knowledge and understanding, and asks appropriate questions of others. Beginning to be able to negotiate and solve problems without aggression e.g. when someone has taken their toy.</p> <p><b>CL:</b> <b>Listening and Attention:</b> Initiates conversations, attends to and takes account of what others say. Takes steps to resolve conflicts with other children e.g. finding a compromise.</p> <p><b>Understanding:</b> Listens and responds to ideas expressed by others in conversation or discussion. Understands humour, e.g. nonsense rhymes, jokes.</p>	<p><b>Self Confidence and Self Awareness:</b> <i>Children are confident to try new activities, and say why they like some more than others. They are confident to speak in a familiar group, will talk about their ideas, and will choose the resources they need for their chosen activity. They say when they do or don't need help.</i></p> <p><b>Managing Feelings and Behaviour:</b> <i>Children talk about how they and others show feelings, talk about their own and others' behaviour, and its consequences, and know that some behaviour is unacceptable. They work as part of a group or class, and understand and follow the rules. They adjust their behaviour to different situations, and take changes of routine in their stride.</i></p> <p><b>CL:</b> <b>Listening and Attention:</b> <i>Children play co-operatively, taking turns with others. They take account of one another's ideas about how to organise their activity. They show sensitivity to others' needs and feelings, and form positive relationships with adults and other children.</i></p> <p><b>Understanding:</b> <i>Children follow instructions involving several ideas or actions. They answer 'how' and 'why' questions about their experiences and in response to stories or events.</i></p>
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<p><b>Understanding:</b> Responds to instructions involving a two-part sequence. Listens and responds to ideas expressed by others in conversation or discussion.</p> <p><b>Speaking:</b> Links statements and sticks to a main theme or intention. Uses talk to organise, sequence and clarify thinking, ideas, feelings and events. Uses language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences.</p> <p><b>PD:</b> <b>Moving and Handling</b> Shows a preference for a dominant hand. Experiments with different ways of moving. Jumps off an object and lands appropriately. Begins to use anticlockwise movement and retrace vertical lines Uses simple tools to effect changes to materials. Handles tools, objects, construction and malleable materials safely and with increasing control. Begins to form recognisable letters.</p> <p><b>Health and Self Care</b></p>	<p>Able to follow a story without pictures or props.</p> <p><b>Speaking:</b> Extends vocabulary, especially by grouping and naming, exploring the meaning and sounds of new words. Links statements and sticks to a main theme or intention. Uses talk to organise, sequence and clarify thinking, ideas, feelings and events. Uses language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences. Introduces a storyline or narrative into their play.</p> <p><b>PD:</b> <b>Moving And Handling</b> Negotiates space successfully when playing racing and chasing games with other children, adjusting speed or changing direction to avoid obstacles. Travels with confidence and skill around, under, over and through balancing and climbing equipment. Shows increasing control over an object in pushing, patting, throwing, catching or kicking it. Uses a pencil and holds it effectively to form recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed.</p> <p><b>Health and Self Care</b> Eats a healthy range of foodstuffs and understands need for variety in food</p>	<p><b>Speaking:</b> <i>Children express themselves effectively, showing awareness of listeners' needs. They use past, present and future forms accurately when talking about events that have happened or are to happen in the future. They develop their own narratives and explanations by connecting ideas or events.</i></p> <p><b>PD:</b> <b>Moving and Handling</b> <i>Children show good control and co-ordination in large and small movements. They move confidently in a range of ways, safely negotiating space. They handle equipment and tools effectively, including pencils for writing.</i></p> <p><b>Health and Self Care</b> <i>Children know the importance for good health of physical exercise, and a healthy diet, and talk about ways to keep healthy and safe. They manage their own basic hygiene and personal needs successfully,</i></p>
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<p>Usually dry and clean during the day. Shows some understanding that good practices with regard to exercise, eating, sleeping and hygiene can contribute to good health. Shows understanding of the need for safety when tackling new challenges, and considers and manages some risks.</p> <p><b>Literacy:</b> <b>Reading</b> Continues a rhyming string. Hears and says the initial sound in words. Can segment the sounds in simple words and blend them together and knows which letters represent some of them. Enjoys an increasing range of books.</p> <p><b>Writing</b> Gives meaning to marks they make as they draw, write and paint. Begins to break the flow of speech into words. Continues a rhyming string. Hears and says the initial sound in words. Can segment the sounds in simple words and blend them together. Uses some clearly identifiable letters to communicate meaning, representing some sounds correctly and in sequence. Writes own name and other things such as labels, captions.</p> <p><b>Maths:</b></p>	<p>Shows understanding of how to transport and store equipment safely. Practices some appropriate safety measures without direct supervision..</p> <p><b>Literacy:</b> <b>Reading</b> Links sounds to letters, naming and sounding the letters of the alphabet. Begins to read words and simple sentences. Uses vocabulary and forms of speech that are increasingly influenced by their experience of books. Knows that information can be retrieved from books and computers.</p> <p><b>Writing</b> Links sounds to letters, naming and sounding the letters of the alphabet. Attempts to write short sentences in meaningful contexts.</p> <p><b>Maths:</b> <b>Number:</b> Counts objects to 10, and beginning to count beyond 10.</p>	<p><i>including dressing and going to the toilet independently.</i></p> <p><b>Literacy:</b> <b>Reading</b> <i>Children read and understand simple sentences. They use phonic knowledge to decode regular words and read them aloud accurately. They also read some common irregular words. They demonstrate understanding when talking with others about what they have read.</i></p> <p><b>Writing</b> <i>Children use their phonic knowledge to write words in ways which match their spoken sounds. They also write some irregular common words. They write simple sentences which can be read by themselves and others. Some words are spelt correctly and others are phonetically plausible.</i></p> <p><b>Maths:</b> <b>Number:</b> Counts objects to 10, and beyond 10.</p>
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<p><b>Number:</b> Recognise some numerals of personal significance. Recognises numerals 1 to 5. Counts up to three or four objects by saying one number name for each item. Counts objects to 10, and beginning to count beyond 10. Selects the correct numeral to represent 1 to 5, then 1 to 10 objects. Counts an irregular arrangement of up to ten objects. Estimates how many objects they can see and checks by counting them. Uses the language of 'more' and 'fewer' to compare two sets of objects. Finds the total number of items in two groups by counting all of them. Says the number that is one more than a given number. Finds one more or one less from a group of up to five objects, then ten objects.</p> <p><b>SSM:</b> Beginning to use mathematical names for 'solid' 3D shapes and 'flat' 2D shapes, and mathematical terms to describe shapes. Selects a particular named shape. Orders two or three items by length or height.</p>	<p>Selects the correct numeral 1 to 10 objects. Counts an irregular arrangement of up to ten objects. Estimates how many objects they can see and checks by counting them. Uses the language of 'more' and 'fewer' to compare two sets of objects. Finds the total number of items in two groups by counting all of them. •Says the number that is one more than a given number. Finds one more or one less from a group of up to five objects, then ten objects.</p> <p><b>SSM:</b> Can describe their relative position such as 'behind' or 'next to'. Orders two items by weight or capacity Uses familiar objects and common shapes to create and recreate patterns and build models. Uses everyday language related to time</p>	<p>Finds the total number of items in two groups by counting all of them. Says the number that is one more than a given number. Finds one more or one less from a group of up to ten objects. In practical activities and discussion, beginning to use the vocabulary involved in adding and subtracting. Records, using marks that they can interpret and explain. Begins to identify own mathematical problems based on own interests and fascinations. <b><i>Children count reliably with numbers from one to 20, place them in order and say which number is one more or one less than a given number. Using quantities and objects, they add and subtract two single-digit numbers and count on or back to find the answer. They solve problems, including doubling, halving and sharing.</i></b></p> <p><b>SSM:</b> Beginning to use everyday language related to money. Orders and sequences familiar events. Measures short periods of time in simple ways. <b><i>Children use everyday language to talk about size, weight, capacity, position, distance, time and money to compare quantities and objects and to solve problems. They recognise, create and describe patterns. They explore characteristics of everyday objects and shapes and use mathematical language to describe them.</i></b></p>
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<p><b>UW:</b> <b>People and Communities:</b> Shows interest in the lives of people who are familiar to them. Remembers and talks about significant events in their own experience. Recognises and describes special times or events for family or friends. Shows interest in different occupations and ways of life. Knows some of the things that make them unique, and can talk about some of the similarities and differences in relation to friends or family. They talk about the features of their own immediate environment and how environments might vary from one another.
